Residents and Neighbors,

It is the end of the Fiscal Year for the City. Although we still need to go through an annual audit the financial projections, including adjustments during COVID, are favorable for ending the year with a surplus. This is also before the City receives ARPA funds through the Federal Government, which Council will prepare for those financial conversations as more is learned on how those funds can be used.

The City Pool reopened with a ribbon cutting ceremony held on Sunday, June 27th. Many residents gathered for a photo before plunging into the pool. With the current heat wave across the country, the pool has been an added relief for keeping cool. Temporary fencing will remain up around the pool until the grass has rooted, but the facility is open with similar hours prior to the pandemic. City Hall reopening also officially occurred on June 21st.

On June 10th, Council held a Special Meeting with Department Heads to go over priorities. The list of accomplishments in FY21 were mentioned and items being proposed for FY22 were reviewed. There was not enough time to discuss Department Head items, so these items will be deferred to individual Department Head presentations over the next several months.

Public Works Director Bill Ahearn reviewed the bidding process and recommended the contract be awarded to low bidder Extreme Excavating. This bid covers the Perry Street and Camp Street areas that the DPW crew are currently working on, which paving is expected to be completed by the end of July.

Planning Commission Chair David Sichel requested input for items to be reviewed by the Commission. Councilors listed Unified Development Ordinance changes regarding housing demolition, signage in downtown businesses, responsible parties in the Municipal Plan Implementation Table, and prioritization or both Neighborhood Development Areas and Community Rating System.

Council continued to receive presentations from organizations in the City and our neighbors:

- Sandy Rousse provided an overview of the relationship between Central Vermont Home, Health
 and Hospice with the Barre City Emergency Medical Services Department. This collaboration
 allowed for increased service to those needing medical care at home through the pandemic
 while decreasing calls for services, and costs, for the City. The overall effort resulted in a
 Community Service Award for Deputy Chief Joseph Aldsworth.
- As part of the Vacant Building Ordinance Update, Fire Marshall Robert Howarth noted the
 decrease in total number of vacant buildings from 154 in 2017 to 26 in 2021. He noted that
 either naming an appeal committee or having the Council hear appeals may be a change to
 support the process and addressed questions with tax sale properties and dealing with
 accumulations of garbage and rodents on abandoned properties.
- Council received a Legislative Update from Barre City Representatives and Washington County Senators. This session focused primarily on the pandemic with resident and business assistance, growing a clean economy, housing rehabilitation, and changes to the per pupil weighting system for education.

- Scott McLaughlin from the Vermont Granite Museum gave an overview of operations from the last time he visited Council nearly 18 months ago. The Museum recently received to restore old film of the granite industry in Barre.
- Council heard presentations from Linda Couture of the Recreation Committee and Alexander Raeburn of the Public Art Committee.

Council completed its annual appointment process to different bodies of the City. New appointments included the following:
